The summit of Mt. Chokai. also known as Dewa Fuji. is under the jurisdiction of Yuza. Past the elevation of 1,200 meters, a flower-filled panorama unfolds.




In summer, Mt. Chokai, one of Japan's 100 Famous Mountains, attracts climbers from all over the world. Above 1,200 meters, fields of flowers are the main attraction. Close to the Sea of Japan, Mt. Chokai receives massive snowfall in winter. As the weather warms, the snow along the ridges slowly melts and alpine plants emerge. From June to September, their delicate flowers burst into bloom for 2 to 3 km along the ridge climbing routes.

Fukura-guchi Trail

Near Tsutaishizaka

The spectacular panorama of the Sea of Japan is another attraction. Mt. Chokai, a free-standing peak, rises straight up from sea level. Trails on the seaward side offer endless views of the sea and flowering meadows. Spring attracts skiers who enjoy the same views and the thrill and unmatched experience of skiing down toward the sea. But conditions can change suddenly, so keep an eye on the weather.



Mt. Chokai Highlight 2 A 360° panorama of ski runs, this is the perfect place for spring skiing! Backcountry skiing in endless fields of snow.





Down from the summit, he mountain's flanks are covered in deep green beech woods. Subterranean water collected over millennia and plentiful snow melt have created waterfalls and springs.

Abundant rainfall is a hallmark of Mt. Chokai, Warm water vapor from the Tsushima Current in the Sea of Japan rises to form clouds that ride on winter northwest seasonal winds and dump rain and snow onto the mountain. This water forms streams that feed the beech forests and turn into rivers and waterfalls as they flow toward the foothills.


Mt. Chokai is a volcano that has erupted repeatedly throughout history. The terrain is full of fissures formed by lava, which filter the rain and snow and

create highly pure water percolating to the surface and for which Yuza is known. The water flowing back into the sea becomes vapor once more, rising and dropping again on the mountain, a cycle that has repeated for millennia.

Thick beech forests grow halfway up the mountain, and the water flowing through gorges creates waterfalls, streams and springs. Trekking course trailheads are accessible by car, so it's worth exploring the forests created by the mountain's water.


A geopark is an area whose geology and terrain can be studied to gain clues about Earth's past and future. Japan has 46 areas designated as geoparks (as of March 2023). Mt. Chokai and Tobishima have been recognized as a geopark site for observing the cycle of life and water.

Mountain rivers fed by snowmelt usually

dry up before summer. Mt. Chokai's plentiful snowfall ensures that snowmelt continues into summer; many of its rivers flow all year long.



Island Geopark explores the cycle of life and water created by sea and land. As seen here, water from the sea rises into the air and is carried by winds to Mt. Chokai, where it falls as rain and snow. The water flows down the mountain to the sea, turning into water vapor and repeating the cycle.






The mountain receives plentiful snow and rain from the sea. The water creates rivers, groundwater and springs flowing down to the foothills to support life and living things. The cycle is repeated as the water flows back to the sea and again to the mountain, an endless repetition of water creation. Mt. Chokai, where water flows to the sea and back again to the mountain. The water also carries nutrients from the mountain to the sea, nurturing salmon that return to the rivers of their birth to spawn and die. Insects and animals go up the food chain, giving the mountain nutrients. Just as the salmon that matures in the ocean to then swim back up the river of its birth to spawn and die, insects and various animals also, caught in the life and death cycle of the food chain, return nutrients to the summit of the mountain. The cycle continues, with nutrients flowing to the sea and nurturing sea life,

just like water is the cycle of life.

Life in the foothills also depends on the mountain's water. Yuza's hamlets grew thanks to the rivers, ponds and springs the water created. Inhabitants use the water for drinking and washing, irrigating paddies and fields to grow rice and vegetables and making sake. Salmon incubation has existed on the Gakko River system, where salmon return every year, for 100 years. At Fukura, oysters grow large thanks to springs bubbling from the ocean floor.

The grand cycle of life and water between Mt. Chokai and the sea supports life in Yuza.


